# Induction and Core Training Programme

# Introduction

It is expected that employers will ensure each CLW receives a suitable induction at the start of their employment as a community link worker, and given the challenging and demanding role that CLW will undertake it is crucial for them to also have a basic core training programme. The following is guidance on what might be included in an induction and core training programme.

# **Outcome of Induction**

The Community Link Worker:

- Understands the context, background and ethos to community link working
- Feels prepared for the CLW role in working with clients on a 1:1 basis
- Builds the relationship with GPs and the wider practice teams
- Develops and maintains the relationship with community resources (both local and national)
- Understands what standard of service they should provide to ensure people are treated with respect and dignity (see paper five)

This programme is not mandatory however it aims to give helpful direction to suggested inputs that should be covered in the induction programmes for Community Link Workers.

It will be the responsibility of each Health and Social Care Partnership in conjunction with their third sector delivery partners and GP practices to ensure each CLW receives a bespoke induction programme. There is complete flexibility in how the induction programme is delivered and by whom, however it is expected that a range of delivery methods will be employed.

This should be seen as the minimum induction and each area will be able to utilise a range of local and national contacts and resources to support the induction to ensure the CLW is equipped to undertake the role.

# **Core Training Programme**

There is no professional qualification or regulatory body for Community Link Workers (CLW); they will come from a variety of backgrounds and experience, each having a unique set of skills and knowledge. Given the challenging and demanding role that CLW will undertake, in general practice, it is crucial for them to have basic core training and awareness in the following:

- ASIST and /or Safe Talk
- Public Protection Awareness Raising and Response
- Adult Support and Protection (ASP): Level 2
- Health Behaviour Change
- Emergency First Aid
- CPR Training
- Trauma Skilled Practice and Resilience
- Bereavement
- Conflict resolution
- Challenging behaviour
